## 2024 CHANGES TO SGI SERVICE LINE

HSB Canada currently offers SERVICE LINE coverage for homeowners to a limit of \$10,000 coverage for the service lines that connect a home to outside utility lines(underground: pipes, propane or natural gas lines, and electrical service and data lines) on the customer's property if any of those lines fail or are accidentally damaged.

Starting in 2024 at renewal time of existing home policies, the limit for any service line older than 50 years will be reduced from \$10,000 to \$2,500.

- If several service lines on the property are damaged in the same incident, a customer can make a claim of up to \$10,000, with a limit of \$2,500 each for lines that haven't been replaced for 50 or more years.
- This coverage limit is tied to the age of the service line, not the age of the home. If a line on the property was installed or replaced within the last 50 years, it may still be covered to \$10,000.

This year we received a grant from the Saskatchewan Lotteries Community Grant Program for the installation of a cement pad with an addition of an arbor and a new bench. We greatly appreciate receiving this grant and the arbor looks great. West Bench Colony did the cement work and very kindly offered to put together the arbor and installing it on the cement. Also thank you to Blaine Taylor for constructing the bench and altering it to fit the arbor.

Cypress Motors from Maple Creek have a program to donate \$300 to a charity for anyone purchasing a new vehicle – Thank you Gerry and Roberta Egland for selecting the cemetery.

Our caretaker for this year was Ted Venema who has done a fantastic job of keeping things looking great. We had a few major issues this year – the road was washed out with runoff – Thank you to the Town and the R.M. of White Valley for their prompt attention to this.

We have received our Veteran's V's (thank you Chantelle and Colin McCuaig for making these and delivering them) and thank you Ted for putting them at all the Veteran gravesites (if anyone notices and discrepancies in where they are please call us – we did our best to determine who was a veteran). Also we would like to thank Mrs. Poisson and her history class for attaching poppies to each of these V's. We will attach a copy of the graves that have been marked with a V on the Town of Eastend website – Eastend Cemetery. If anyone sees an error please contact one of us.

It has been brought to our attention that some of the older graves are in need of some attention. This is the responsibility of the families. Our committee is only responsible for the general upkeep of the cemetery grounds and paying for this is done by donations to our committee. All the extras we do there (for example the arbor and the benches) is done by applying for and receiving grants or from donations made strictly towards those projects. And speaking of DONATIONS – please remember us this fall. We were once again on the Donors Choice forms and we will be having our Christmas Tree at the Post Office again. ### 100 Years Ago – 1923

Some 30 residents of Eastend have left, or about to leave, for the Coast to spend the winter.

Hines, "The Jeweler" has just received a shipment of hand painted china made by the famous Noritaki of Japan.

Wright and Jickling advertises "Good Cheer" square heaters with a roller grate and a brick lined firebox. This firebox has a capacity that makes it possible to hold fire for 12 hours without attention. The square pattern is a welcome departure from the old round form and is suitable for any room.

The ever popular Maude Henderson Co. will be at the Pastime Theatre for 2 evenings. This company has the reputation of being the best of its kind in the north west country. Two plays will be put on and both plays had previously run in New York for two years.

The world's population is 1,804,187,631 with New York being the largest city followed by London and Berlin.

### 90 Years Ago – 1933

Interest payments on outstanding farm loans, held by resident Sask. farmers, will be waived for the period Nov 1, 1932 – Nov. 1, 1933.

A sentence of six months of hard labour was issued for attempting suicide by taking strychnine at a cafe in Eastend.

### 80 Years Ago – 1943

Claydon had their first carnival with Olson's Orchestra of Frontier supplying the music. Net proceeds for the evening were approximately \$575.00.

Mr. Hensmen sold four black broodmares to the RCMP for the breeding station at Fort Walsh. The RCMP have moved all their breeding mares from Ottawa and Regina to the old site of Fort Walsh and are making it a breeding station for all of Canada. Suitable log buildings are being erected at the fort for wintering of the horses.

Laurence Potter, owner of the Gower Ranch a few miles west of Eastend, passed away at the age of 60 following a lengthy illness. He was an enthusiastic naturalist going deeply into the study of bird lore. In the course of his studies he added a great deal to natural history records in Regina and elsewhere and was consulted by many noted naturalists of this continent.

The new owner of the Whitemud Tavern, Mr. S. P. Soloway, of Oshawa, Ontario, has arrived with his wife and two young children. Plans are to reopen the dining room and

with the housing shortage, turn some of the hotel space into 3-roomed suites.

Honors for raising high quality silver foxes were awarded to Mr. Jean Lebastard at the annual fur rancher's field day held in Tompkins.

Vidora News states that 48 young men from their community are now serving overseas.

The replacement of old farm equipment, which is still in working condition, for new equipment is strongly discouraged. Each farmer should first write the nearest Rationing Officer to determine whether or not a permit will be granted for the purchase of new equipment.

### 70 Years Ago – 1953

Tomato juice, soft drinks, packaged foods and cigarettes will now be sold in beer parlors in Sask. as an amendment to the Liquor Act. Beer parlors still may not legally serve sandwiches or other food. This amendment marks the first time that anything but beer has been legally sold in licensed premises in Sask. since the sale of beer by the glass was permitted in 1935.

A two- day carnival was held in Eastend to raise money to build a skating rink. \$6000 was raised bringing the sum total in the building fund to \$10,000. The objective is \$20,000.

### 60 Years Ago – 1963

Sask. Government Telephones awarded tenders for 6 equipment buildings in the province. Eastend contractor, H.W. Lacey will construct the building in Eastend.

Patients from Eastend in the new Geriatric Centre in Swift Current are Mrs. Jean Lebastard, Mrs. Lily Brown, Mrs. Leslie Ingram and Mrs. Jack Howard.

Payments of 1964 Hospitalization Tax and Medical Care Premiums are due on Nov. 30th. A family unit is \$52 and a single over 18 yrs is \$26. Residents of Swift Current Health Region pay only the hospitalization tax portion; \$20 for a single and \$40 for a family. The Medical Corporation is levied by the region and collected through municipal offices.

### 50 Years Ago – 1973

Mr. Ed Wright was honored with a dinner and a plaque presentation commemorating 50 years as a Ford dealer.

Morris and Mabel Selmon have sold their store to Ed and Bonnie Grubbe of Regina.

Irvine Pidt and Randy Cripps bought out the North American Lumber Co. It is now known as South West Lumber and Feed.

A new addition to Eastend is the apartment building being erected by Nelson Homes and owned by Kendricks.

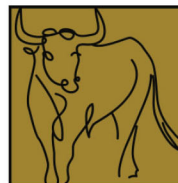

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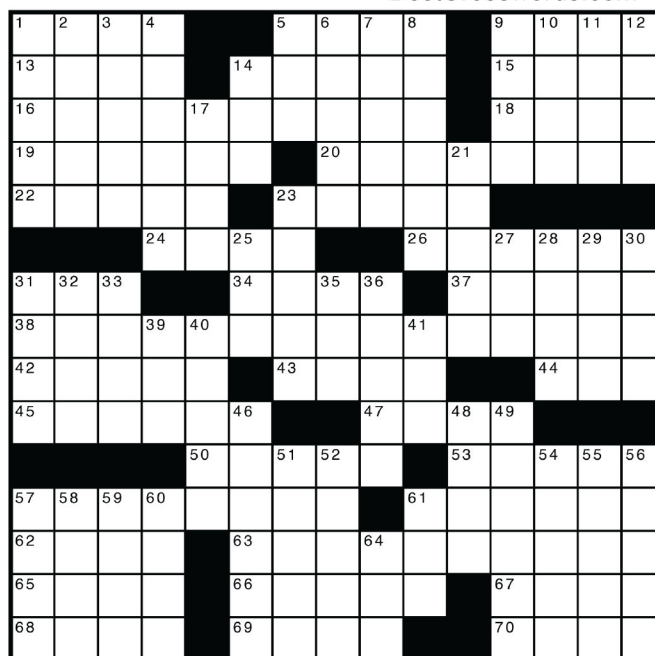

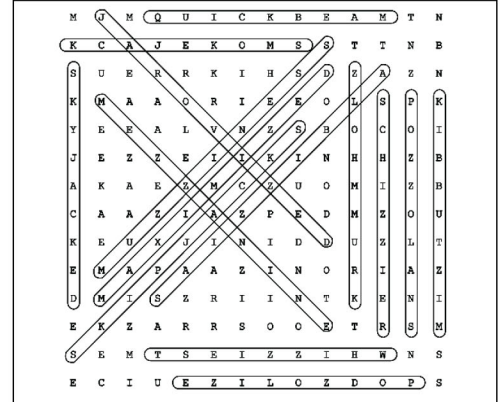
