June is National Indigenous History Month in Canada, an opportunity to learn about the unique cultures, traditions and experiences of First Nations, Inuit & Metis.

The Eastend Library will be showing the documentary film, *Singing Back the Buffalo* by award-winning Cree filmmaker Tasha Hubbard from the Peepeekisis First Nation in Saskatchewan.

"The buffalo are moving into the public consciousness, but what has been missing is the full picture of what they mean to us as Indigenous peoples. I have been dreaming about the possibilities for the restoration of the large herds of buffalo for decades, and this film will follow my journey as I meet with Indigenous peoples who share a similar dream."

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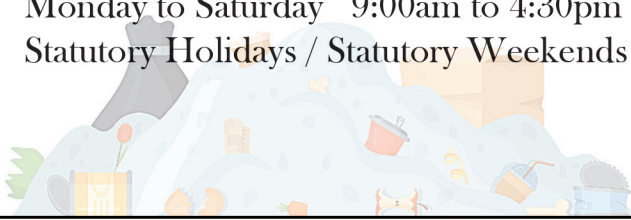

110 Years Ago – 1915

Wilton and Gowanlock, McCormick Agency in Eastend, advertise harrows, discs and McLaughlin Buick automobiles.

Mr. & Mrs. D. Barrow, recently married, left for England on the ill fated Lusitania where Mrs. Barrow lost her life when the big liner sank off the Irish coast. Mr. Barrow survived and was on his way back to England to join the army. Mrs. Barrow is the daughter of Mr. W.J. Morgan who lives 5 miles southeast of Maple Creek.

The Eastend Townsite Co. advertises opportunities in Eastend. J.C. Strong is the president and managing director.

100 Years Ago – 1925

E. Cole of Southfork was part of a pilgrimage to Ottawa in support of ranchers, land leases and increasing corral and feeding sites from 160 acres to 320 acres.

Mr. J.C. Berry, residing on a farm southeast of Eastend, has invented a seed and feed saver. The invention has been patented in Washington and used to separate wheat from the straw pile.

Strong's irrigation dam in Galleon coulee washed out flooding the hay flats below. The lower floor of Harry Richardson's ranch house flooded forcing the occupants to the second storey.

New fashions for the ladies are shorter skirts (occasionally above the knee), bright colors and larger hats.

The origin of Mother's Day was in an act passed by U.S. Legislature designating the second Sunday in May as "Mother's Day". The emblem of Mother's Day is the carnation, either pink or white. Those with living mothers wear a pink carnation, while those who have lost their mothers wear a white carnation.

The Deputy Minister of Health for the Dominion says there are 8,000-10,000 drug addicts in Canada and the provinces must deal with the issue without delay.

J. Minall planted 1500 trees on his farm in the Atkins district. 300 Evergreens and trees were planted in the school grounds on Arbor day.

A.P. Gilchrist traded his pure bred stallion to Ivan Topham for a number of white faced cattle.

90 Years Ago – 1935

A petition was signed by 137 residents of the Robsart-Vidora district and sent to the Dominion gov't. They request an irrigation project known as Robsart-Vidora Irrigation District #1 be constructed. The source of water comes from Cypress Hills and from Sucker, Belanger, Davis and Fairwell creeks. The main dam would be on the Frenchman river, 4 miles west of Ravenscrag with 10,000 acres under irrigation.

The original irrigation in Eastend was operated by Enright and Strong and previous to 1917 operated successfully. It consisted of a dam west of town and had a system of irrigation over an approximate 10,000 acres. Two smaller dams were constructed in coulees and served as a reserve. After this land was sold and divided up there was no one responsible for its upkeep and the present owners cannot afford to restore the system. It is the wish of the local people that the government take over and restore into a working condition again providing employment for families.

In 1920 a petition was circulated south and west of Eastend to launch an irrigation project at a cost of \$1 million. The scheme outlined the diversion of Battle and Belanger creeks into Davis Lake and

the construction of a dam 4 miles west of the lake across the Whitemud valley. The dam was to be 250'(?) in height, the full width of the valley and built of concrete.

Piano students of Mrs. H.S. Jones and George Haddad performed a concert at Simpson's Hall. A mandolin trio by Eva Chornobrywy, G. Fetter and A. Ghetti was also enjoyed. Mr. A. Ghetti, band conductor, has made a real contribution to the musical culture of the town. The young boy's band is conducted by Eldon Bengtson and a rare touch here is female cornetist, Virginia Bengtson.

The Whitemud Tavern owner, H. Desilets, plans to apply for a license to sell beer on the hotel premises. Members of the Anglican Church Women's auxiliary and United Church Ladies' Aid are circulating a petition to be forwarded to the provincial government opposing a beer parlour license in Eastend.

The Silver Jubilee of King George V and Queen Mary's 25 years on the throne is being celebrated. The country schools are holding celebrations followed by their annual Sports Day.

A Shetland pony contest was launched by the Sask. Dep't of Agriculture in an effort to kill at least 2 million gophers. The first 1,000 gopher tails turned into any teacher in the province wins the pony.

The Ravenscrag Percheron Horse Club has been organized with Peter Chourrout as president, F.P. Arendt as vice and A.R. Whipple as secretary.

80 Years Ago – 1945

Eastend Dairy listed for sale, for information contact Mrs. O. Honig.

A shock to the world, President F.D. Roosevelt, age 63, died at his summer home in Georgia. This comes at a time when grave decisions are pending to ensure the peace and safety of all nations.

In the April 26th edition, seeding is in full swing in the Claydon area.

Nick Shourounis, half brother to Jack Cardaris and brother to Spiro Shourounis, has been employed as cook at Jack's Café since 1928.

PFRA has made arrangements to give 2,000 acre-feet of water to the Saco area in Montana to help irrigate their sugar beet and alfalfa areas. P.F.R.A. is asking nothing for the water stating "It is a part of the good neighbor policy between Canada and the United States". Canada and the USA share international waters on a 50-50 basis which means the PFRA can only divert the water flowing down the Frenchman river, leaving the rest to go to the States. More water will now go through as a result of this new agreement.

A celebration of VE (Victory in Europe) was held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Chatard in Ravenscrag with about 100 attending.

The annual 10 day holiday course for rural girls and women ages 15-30 will be held at Swift Current Experimental Farm in July. This course provides a change of surroundings, new interests and new faces. Lectures will be given by staff of the Experimental Farm and the Department of Women's Work of the U of S.

70 Years Ago – 1955

Former Divide couple, the Hemsings, now living near Rolling Hills, had their 21st child and the oldest child is 23 yrs of age.

Mattie Hume and her daughter Shirley left recently to make their new home in New Zealand.

Mrs. Kathleen Gutwin has been employed as the teacher at Brownville for the remainder of the term.

Obituaries for Mr. Albert Cole, age 78, and Mrs. Edith Davis, age 74, of Divide.

60 Years Ago – 1965

A John Deere service school was held at the Pastime Theatre with 40-50 people attending.

Library Week was held in Eastend and memberships in the library were encouraged. Family memberships are \$5; single - \$3; students - \$1 and children under 12 are free.

About 75 Sask. and Alberta pilots attended the province's first course for aerial spray operation at the Regina Flying Club.

An Easter Monday Dance, sponsored by the hospital staff, was held to raise money for a TV for the children's ward.

In the Years Gone By section – 1930 - the Kokott Ranch Resort Co. Ltd., capitalized at \$200,000, received it's charter with head office in Eastend.

Auction sale advertised for Walter Berg in Loomis area.

Attending the U of S seventh annual Academic Competition is Delaine Fandrick representing the Eastend School Unit. This is to encourage scholar study by giving recognition to Grade 12 students of superior academic attainment and to acquaint them with opportunities for study at the U of S.

50 Years Ago – 1975

Louella Kroetch is the staff cook at Wolf Willow Lodge.

The R.M of Frontier minutes state that proposed construction of a new hospital in Climax be voted on by the taxpayers.

An auction sale is advertised for Revell Moore of the Loomis area.

The Whitemud Minor Hockey League had a successful hockey season with 25 teams participating and well over 300 boys taking part.

Mrs. Shelly Parker of Lynn Lake, MB won Manitoba's Master Bowler's Championship at Brandon. She won a trip to Edmonton and a chance to bowl there.

Laverne Pinlac has been appointed Administrator for Wolf Willow Lodge after Mr. Kennedy's retirement due to health reasons.

Mr. Jack Schaumleffel of Swift Current has bought Hi-Way Auto Body and has moved here with his wife and daughter.

Julie Leroy was chosen to participate in a Girl Guides event in Ottawa and will fly from Regina.

The Activity Centre for Seniors opened earlier in the year and continues to be a popular place. The card parties have always had 5 tables or more and the Saturday nite dances have an attendance of 45-90 with people coming from Shaunavon, Climax and Robsart.

The Eastend School Unit Band held a concert and bandmaster David Hooper, is to be commended. The Junior band has students from Climax, Frontier and Eastend. The Senior band has students from Climax, Frontier, Eastend and Consul.

The Eastend graduation valedictorian was Jim Wagner and the guest speaker was Lynn Currie who graduated in 1971 from Eastend.

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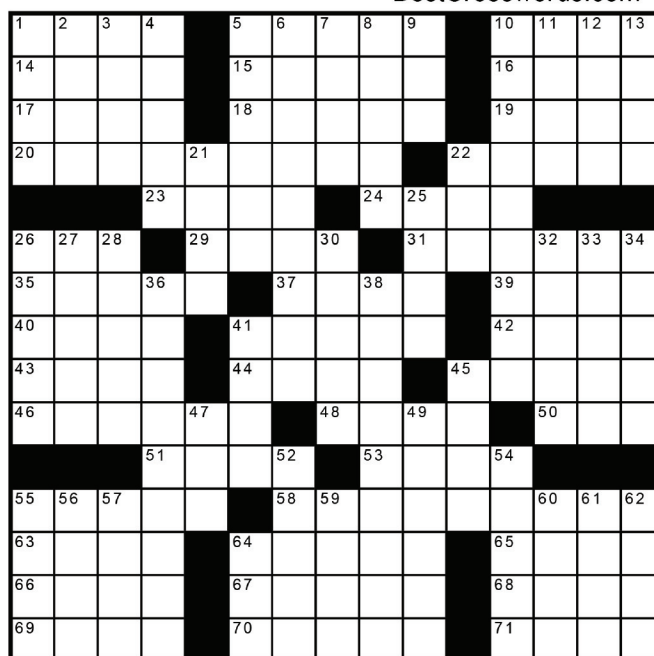
